Love, Jan The following proposed amendment will be presented at the annual AHAA convention in October.

On page 31, Section 2: add Immediate AHAA Past President before AHA President The section will read: Only elected officers, as listed in Section 1 above, as well as the-mmediate Past AHAA President, AHA President and the Arkansas Society of Directors of Volunteer Services (ASDVS) President shall have a vote on motions made at AHAA board meetings.

At the May 28 Teleconference Meeting the following changes were made to the Policies and Procedures.

Insert new section on page 39 after Volunteer Hours and before Annual Dues:

Telephonic and Emergency Meetings

Telephonic Meetings: Meetings of the Board may be conducted by means of telephone conference or using other communications equipment whereby all persons participating in the meeting can hear and speak to each other.

Emergency Provisions for Telephonic Meetings: In the event of an emergency, as determined by a vote of the Board, that prevents holding a regularly scheduled Board meeting or annual meeting of the Delegates in any year, the transaction of other essential business will be conducted by mail or electronic transmission in accordance with applicable law.

Guidelines for Telephonic Meetings:

Ample time be given in advance of a teleconference meeting is to be held.

Member should seek recognition from the chair before beginning to speak and identify themselves before speaking.

Motions to be voted on by a roll call vote. The President or Secretary will call each voting member by name and ascertain their vote. The roll call vote will determine the outcome of the vote and will not be recorded in the minutes, only whether the motion passed or not.

The minutes should be approved as the Board minutes are usually approved. Action Without a Meeting: Binding action may be taken without a meeting upon the written consent of all Board Members then holding office. The written consents will be included in the minutes filed with the records and have the same effect as a unanimous vote. The written consent may be delivered to the President by electronic communication, and the signature of the Board member may be affixed to the consent by any reasonable means, including without limitation facsimile signature or electronic image.

On page 40 under Expense Allowance 2 a.:

Reimburse covered automobile travel at thirty-five cents (\$.35) per mile for the driver of the car with no attachment to AHA or any other entity reimbursements <u>if the reimbursement is fifty (50) miles or more one way. Special circumstances will be reviewed by the Executive Committee.</u>



Approximately 100 masks were made for our hospital by our auxilians. Below are some of the staff with the masks.








